Election Results

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December 5, 2024

- Federal
 - Republican control of Presidency, Senate, and House
 - Senate: 53 R 47 D (+4 R)
 - House: approx. 220 R 215 D
 - Republican Leadership across Chambers
 - Senator John Thune (SD) will serve as the next Senate Majority Leader
 - Speaker Mike Johnson (LA) and Majority Leader Steve Scalise (LA) will remain in their leadership positions
 - Committee Leadership
 - Senator Tim Scott (SC) is expected to serve as the next Chairman of the Senate Banking, Housing & Urban Affairs Committee, and Senator Elizabeth Warren (MA) will serve as ranking member
 - Senator Shelley Moore Capito (WV) is expected to serve as the next Chair of the Senate Environment & Public works Committee. Current Chairman Tom Carper did not seek re-election, so ranking member to be determined.



- Federal
 - Committee Leadership Continued
 - Senator Ted Cruz (TX) likely to serve as Chairman of Senate Committee on Commerce, Science & Transportation, Senator Maria Cantwell (WA) likely ranking member
 - House Transportation Chairman Sam Graves (MO) could continue serving as Chairman, or could shift to Rep. Rick Crawford (AR); Rep. Rick Larsen (WA) expected to continue serving as Ranking Member
 - Former Representative Sean Duffy (WI) announced as nominee for Secretary of Transportation



- State
 - Republican control of Senate and House continuing
 - Senate: 33 R 23 D (no change)
 - House: 100 R 80 D (+2 D)
 - New Democratic Leadership
 - Senator Harold Jones (Augusta) to serve as Senate Minority Leader
 - Representative Carolyn Hugley (Columbus) to serve as House Minority Leader
 - Republican Leadership Continuing in House and Senate
 - Speaker of the House Jon Burns
 - Speaker Pro-Tempore Jan Jones
 - Majority Leader Chuck Efstration
 - Lieutenant Governor Burt Jones
 - President Pro-Tempore John F. Kennedy
 - Majority Leader Steve Gooch

2024 Elections: Referendums

- Voters rejected Transit SPLOST Referendums in Cobb and Gwinnett
 - Cobb: 62% rejected 38% approved

• Gwinnett: 53% rejected 47% approved (comparison – 2020 vote: 50.5%-49.5%)

2024 Elections: Referendums

- Voters rejected new Transportation SPLOSTs
 - Douglas and Hall counties rejected a 1% sales tax over a 6 year period, which would have funded transportation and transit projects
- Successful General SPLOST Renewals
 - Henry County voted to continue a 1% sales tax for 6 years (by a much smaller margin than usual)
 - Forsyth County approved a 1% sales tax renewal for 6 years
 - Both general SPLOSTs to be used not only for transportation, but also parks, libraries and other capital projects



2024 Elections: Referendums

- Georgia differed from national results
 - 19 out of 26 (73%) transit referendums passed across the country
 - For example, Nashville approved a half-cent sales tax increase to fund accelerated expansion of Nashville's bus system, build out dozens of miles of sidewalks and bike lanes and upgrade nearly 600 traffic signals to better handle vehicle congestion. The tax increase will cover around 46% of the plan's total cost. Expected to generate \$2.3B
 - Richland County (Columbia) South Carolina approved a 25-year 1% sales tax to fund community and countywide transportation projects. 22% of the revenue will go to funding COMET (Central Midlands Regional Transit Authority). Expected to generate \$990M




MARTA Bus Network Redesign
